He was remembered as a barefoot boy, whose mother died before he was 6. He was "bound out" to Jacob Brown, given room and board for labor for 2 years. At 9, he worked for Joseph F. Marston at \$5/month, with a raise to \$7/month until he overslept one day and was fired. He then worked for Mr. Batchelder as a farmhand. In the 1850's, he bought 25 acres of land in North Hampton, which grew over time to 500 acres. He had several major accidents during his life: a hay bail fell on his head. In 1871 at 57, he was kicked by a horse. In 1876, there was a revival in town. He had not been a religious man, but when he heard that, "one will be taken and the other left", he was baptized at 63.
